Aarin Burch is an African-American filmmaker based in Oakland. Her films explore racial prejudice, ethnicity, gender identity, and familial relationships through experimental, narrative, and documentary approaches. Aarin is an inductee into the Black Filmmakers Hall of Fame, and she recently worked as production manager for the Alice Walker/Pratimah Parmar film, Warrior Marks. Her films, Dreams of Passion and Spin Cycle, have been exhibited at numerous film festivals nationally and internationally.



A member of the Blackfeet Nation, George has been making films within the Native American community for 25 years. He was the first Native American to become inducted into the Director's Guild of America, and founded a film/video training program at the Institute for American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, New Mexico. His most recent work, Surviving Columbus, explores the Pueblo people's 450 years of contact with Europeans, and has earned Peabody and Emmy awards. He is currently preparing to release a feature version of Ishi, the Last Yahi, for which he will hold credits for writer, director, and editor.






