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

Bio: Monique Harper-Desir, Mo is a multi-racial visual artist from the Pioneer Valley, Western Massachusetts. She currently is a mother, an artist, an arts educator and works at Access Humboldt as their director of Admin & Development. She also utilizes her knowledge around Media Literacy to lead antiracist & equity based workshops and trainings. She first fell in love with visual arts around 8 with a 35mm camera and got her first video camera around 14. She mainly has created creative fiction or documentary style narratives. She loves writing & directing the most in productions.

Mo got her Associates in Media Production from Greenfield Community College and immediately started teaching AV Tech to middle and high school youth upon her graduation. She also led an "arts for change" film program from 2011 - 2016 at Amherst Media, where youth were taught film techniques as well as media literacy to recorrect the misrepresentations we often find in media creation. She has worked with a number of organizations creating film or supplying media based education like The Ford Foundations, Fractured Atlas, The Allied Media Conference, The Tulane University Black Arts Festival and SXSW.




Woodrow Hunt

Woodrow Hunt is a Klamath/Modoc and Cherokee filmmaker and artist. He grew up in the Indigenous community of Portland, OR. Growing up in the Native community and in a family of artists gave him the experiences which shaped his interest in visual storytelling. He founded the Indigenous film production company Tule Films when he began his work as a freelance filmmaker working in the Pacific Northwest and realized his desire to solely work with Indigenous people. Tule Films works with Indigenous owned businesses. Tribes. and Non-profits or projects which collaborate directly with the Native community. The majority of his work, through Tule Films, is focused on education. In 2017 during the implementation of Oregon's Senate Bill 13: Tribal History/Shared History Tule Films began working with the Confluence Project, Confluence connects people to the history, living cultures, and ecology of the Columbia River system through Indigenous voices. Together Woodrow, through Tule Films, and Confluence created a series of short documentaries called Stories from the River. The short documentaries share personal stories and insights about the history, culture, and ecology of the land and its people as told by community elders and tribal leaders from along the Columbia River. The specific themes were chosen so that they may be incorporated into school curriculums focused on Indigenous people. They continue to make short documentaries centered around the Columbia River.

Woodrow is also an experimental artist working with his creative partner Olivia Camfield. His focus explores the functions and relationships between digital video and memory. Their films have appeared in the print and online publications of Artforum and Hyperallergic. Their work has screened at film events such as the Camden International Film Festival, Ann Arbor Film Festival, Portland International Film Festival, Alchemy Film and Moving Image Festival, MoMA DocFortnight and others. They are featured artists at COUSIN Collective, a collective supporting Indigenous artists expanding the form of film.




FROM TRASH TO TREASURE: TURNING NEGATIVE INTO POSITIVES

Meet the 54th Humboldt Int'l Film Festival Faculty Advisor, Dr. Michelle Cartier



This is Michelle's first year as a faculty adviser for the fest. An alumni of Humboldt State University, having received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Film, Dr. Michelle Cartier is an educator, poet, athlete and community activist whose philosophical research continues to examine 'love' as an ethics and responsibilities of a media culture. She holds a PhD in Media and Communication from the European Graduate School where she worked closely with French Philosopher Jean-Luc Nancy, through an extensive study of his writings on Being Singular Plural, and under the mentorship of French filmmaker Claire Denis for her revered filmic style of non-verbal language in cinema.

Michelle was recognized in 2006 at the Humboldt International Student Run Film Festival for her short experimental work Redemption: An Ode to Stanley Tookie Williams, receiving Honorable Mention in Documentary, and has, ever since, continued to strengthen the plurality of her personal and political stance as an artist. She is extremely thrilled to be charging this next year's path with the current HIFF team, "we have A LOT of exciting things in the works!"

As a filmmaker and media poet, her work consistently pushes the boundaries of the frame and is often best translated through interactive media performances. Characteristically including short original films, socio-political remixes of pop-culture, and live djing, Dr. M. Cartier's theoretical focus un-works as a relentless invitation for her audience to coauthor an experience of authentic communication. The technical style of her filmmaking is usually dense with an eccentric mix of 16mm Optical Printing, super-8 found footage, and multi-media digital remixes. Her publications, events, and films include: The Media Poet, a philosophical text on the contemporary responsibilities and ethics of a media culture, published in 2011 by Apropos Press. PUNISHMENT On Trial: Step 34, Reclaiming Human Rights, a multi-media event and speaker panel organized to address the complexities associated to the death penalty; and Identity and Orifices Part II, a collection of short experimental films on the incision of love and forgiveness. Michelle has been a lecturer in the Department of Theatre, Film, and Dance at HSU since 2013.

KYLIE HOLUB




