

## Featured Film Presentation

### Hour of the Furnaces (La hora de los hornos)

Directed in 1968 by Argentine filmmakers Fernando Solana and Octavio Getino, this film showcases the revolutionary capabilities

of cinema as a political weapon by examining the effects of American and European imperialism and neocolonialism that are suggested to have caused widespread poverty and class distinction across the nations of South America. La hora de los hornos (The Hour of the Furnaces) is one of the most lucid



After completing an undergraduate degree in Management Science from UCSD and a Masters in Fine Arts from the UCLA School of Theater Film and Television, Animation Workshop, Blonder went to develop an interactive museum installation for the Skirball Cultural

Center. He also worked in



the start-up art department of DreamWorks Interactive. Roger Blonder then focused his full time efforts on his short animated film The Common Sense of the Wisdom Tree, which has screened in over 25 festivals and won six major awards. He is currently teaching the animation and new media courses at the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California.
